Larry - No. I think the majority of the teenagers are good drivers. They should be given a chance. Then if they don't drive correctly, this privilege may be taken away.

Melvin - No. The age limit doesn't need to be raised, but every would-be driver should take a course in driver's training.

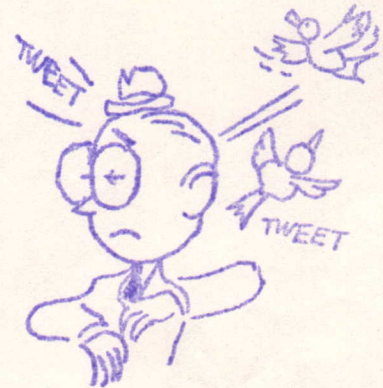
